#### HOT AUGUST PIPES is back!!

After a couple of years, it was time to resume this fun event. And if you have not heard our clubhouse organ in the last year, there have been several significant improvements. So, come and hear *jazz talent*, **Craig Browning**, work his magic on this fine instrument and enjoy some ice cream on what will most likely be a very typical hot summer day in Fair Oaks.

### About the Artist:

**Craig Browning** studied classical piano with Jean and Ray Drake of the Drake Studios, Oakland for 6 years. He knew that was not his forte. His father was a stride piano player and exposed Craig to the music of Goodman, Ellington, Waller, and Tin Pan Alley tunes, all of his life. His father also had some theatre organ recordings of George Wright and Jesse Crawford, among others.

Craig is also a Pipe and Theatre organist. He was introduced, at age 5, to the Wurlitzer Theatre Organ at *Ye Olde Pizza Joynt*, in Hayward, while Bill Langford played there. "One person I wished I could have met at this time was Larry Vanucci, unfortunately I never did."


As a youngster, Craig expressed interest in the B3 Hammond. From 13 on, that was his passion, and he played with Zeke Nuez, guitarist from Hawaii and teen Ronnie Wilson, organist. He joined the Chabot College Jazz band at 16. He has done theater work for the *BLACK REPERTORY GROUP* providing music and sound effects for their productions for several years.

"Having Asperger's Syndrome and other learning disabilities (music being a refuge from the "Normal" world, especially around the time of High School) I never was a good sight reader and shied away from classical music, except as a learning tool (oddly enough I can write music notation easier than I can read it)."

Craig has played keyboards with Pete Yellin and Bob Edmonson, Diamond G and her Gentlemen, Margie Turner, and Georgia Freeman.

He played organ and piano with WALTER SAVAGE AND THE SAVAGE FIVE. He was the pianist for DONALD DUCK BAI-LEY's trio, has played organ with the Funky Beaulah Band of San Francisco and played for Bruce Davidson's Band, San Francisco.

In 1991, he moved to Vancouver, WA, to study piano tuning at the Piano Hospital and got re-introduced to Theatre Organ at

*Uncle Milt's Pizza & Pipes* while Skip O'Donnell played there. He joined Nor-Cal after returning to the Bay Area around 1994.

Since then, he has studied with Dave Hegarty and has performed repeatedly for several organ clubs in the Bay Area, including the Sonoma Organ Club. He is a member of the American Theater Organ Society and participates in the Open Consoles once a month at Berkeley; Sierra Chapter members have also heard him at several of our Open Consoles, as well.

"My theater organ concept is more Fats Waller (who made most of his pipe organ records on an Estey church organ), Buddy Cole, Billy Nalle and Johnny Seng, in addition to what I know about Hammond playing and what I've learned about orchestral arranging (most notably the late Henry Mancini's book which is tied to various arrangements he did on LP's mainly Mr. Lucky [w/Buddy Cole on Hammond] and Peter Gunn)."

Currently, Craig is working on a Bachelor's degree from the Jazzschool Institute in Berkeley. He is playing in the Blues band, Billy & the Thrillers.

Wendell has recently restored the glorious pipe organ that once graced the lobby of the San Francisco Fox Theater. This historically significant instrument performs as it once did in its heyday.

William Coale, Chairman of the NorCal Theatre Organ Society, a licensed renewal coach, educational consultant, pipe organ technician, editorial writer and all around ne'er do well punster, has been playing theater organ since 1973. Most recently he has presented concerts for ECHO organ club in San Carlos and the Sierra Chapter of ATOS.



Ragtime piano duo, Jack and Chris Bradshaw have performed in 11 states and Canada. Their flying fingers dance off the keyboard to Jack's fourhand arrangements of popular rags, cakewalks, marches and novelty numbers. Jack also performs solos.

The ATOS Convention was great fun and the

weather, thankfully, was quite nice. We heard some very nice organs in a variety of venues. I am amazed at the ingenuity exhibited by those who simply must have a theatre pipe organ on their property. It was most kind of these people to share their "pride and joys" with us.

With the public venues we visited, one glaringly obvious point was that, if an



organ is in a venue that supports and encourages its use, it will be showcased and maintained to a much greater degree than an instrument that might just be there because of its historical value. There's that "champion" thing again. It takes dedication, know-how and money to make these relics of a bygone era sing again. Once they can sing, it takes people who go to the trouble to make sure an audience benefits by the experience. And benefit, they will. Used regularly, a theatre pipe organ becomes an expected part of the show. Play the audience in, play at

intermission, play the audience out, play a concert, play a silent movie. If it's there, perhaps it should be used. Hey - what a concept!

This is the reason the Board of the Sierra Chapter voted unanimously to donate the Mendenhall Wurlitzer to the State Theatre Arts Guild in Oroville, CA. The organ will be restored and installed in the historic Oroville State Theatre. It has a champion in Sierra Chapter members David and Linda Dewey who also belong to the Mt Shasta Chapter ATOS. David's vision for the organ is a theatre pipe organ devotee's dream: an organ in a theatre whose

audience appreciates it's value as a part of their entertainment experience. We'll miss the old girl but look forward to hearing her loud and clear in her new home.



We heard another "old girl" on JULY 24th - the Grant Union High School organ came out of hibernation early this year. Our Mr. October at the

CAM, **Paul Quarino**, came to play and accompany a couple of silent movies starring Charlie Chaplin. We had a very good turnout for our first summer presentation. This was a joint venture with our George Wright concert co-sponsors, the Grant Union High School Alumni Association. Hmmm, perhaps we will start a new tradition. It would certainly be nice to use that venerable instrument more than once a year.

July will close with a ragtime trio concert at Wendell Davis's home on July 30th. 1/3 of the trio is our own Bill Coale. Sierra Chapter will keep you informed of other potential public events in the Bay Area while work progresses on BCT.



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
