Ron Rhode has been a major performer in the theatre pipe organ world for more than four decades. Since 1974 his concert career has taken him across the US from coast to coast, into Canada, England, and Australia. Ron is known for his "traditional" theatre organ style, playing music from the golden era of the "Unit Orchestra" the 1920's and 1930's.

Growing up in Illinois, and moving to Phoenix in 1973, Ron played theatre organ for Organ Stop Pizza in Phoenix and Mesa for 21 years. He has continued

a career in church music which started at his Illinois home church, Port Byron Methodist Church, and is currently service musician at 1st United Methodist Church in Phoenix. In his non-musical life, Ron taught 2nd grade and Library Science for Mesa Public Schools, Mesa, AZ, until his retirement after 20 years. Since that time, he had been teaching 5th and 6th grade Class Piano for Arizona School for the Arts, Phoenix, AZ, and has retired as of May, 2019.

Another facet of his life has been his legacy of recordings on many of the finest theatre organ installations to be found! He has received great reviews for both the technical production and the musical artistry. An old/new recording is now available! Directions: Take I-5 towards Lodi and exit at Hwy 12 West towards Rio Vista. When you cross over the Rio Vista Bridge (the big drawbridge) take the first off ramp, keep to the right and go under the bridge and head south (along the river on Front Street). You will come to a 4-way stop sign (Main St.). Keep going south two more blocks to California Street, turn right and go one block. The Hall is on the right, at the corner of California and Second Street. Hunter Hall is the L shaped building. Parking is on the street. Allow about 1 1/4 hr. from the Sacramento area.

Scenic Route: Take I-5 towards Lodi and exit at Twin Cities Road (west). Drive past the TV towers, and turn left (south) onto Hwy 160 (River Road). Continue on Hwy 160 to Hwy 12 and turn right onto the Rio Vista Bridge, then follow directions above.

Adventure Route: Take Hwy 50/I-80 to West Sacramento and exit at Jefferson Blvd. Continue south on Jefferson Blvd (Hwy 84) to Courtland Rd and turn right. Then a left onto Ryer Ave and continue a few miles on the delta levies. Then right onto the Ryer Island Ferry. Note - Ferry is free and runs every 20 minutes. Exit Ferry and turn left onto River Rd. Turn left on Front Street, and follow directions above.

to the star of the show, **Bill Coale**, who played a casual but fun concert. As an educator, Bill's presentations included a lot of interesting background.

As many of you know by now, we had a catastrophic attack by rats on the leather parts of the regulators that are under the stage of the Fair Oaks Clubhouse! We had noticed an issue of some gnawing on the leather in February. But

since the organ has been in the building for 37 years and we had never had a problem, I will admit that I did not react with a level of alarm that should have taken immediate action.

However as of now, Dave Moreno and Terry Clifton, with some great help from Sean Ventura, Fair Oaks Parks Supervisor, have removed all the regulators from under the stage to be repaired. We have two estimates so far for releathering the regulators and getting the organ back to playing as soon as possible. It will be a considerable expenditure, but the Chapter does have the necessary funds. The Board will take immediate action to restore the organ to playing condition and take measures to prevent a similar reoccurrence.
